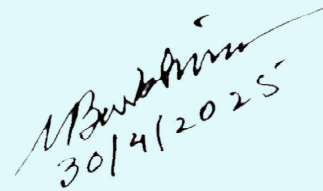
This year (2025), the Diphu Government college is the lead College of Karbi Anglong and West Karbi Anglong district in Assam State School Education Board (ASSEB), Div-II. For the first time, the Diphu Government College has been selected as an Examination Centre for Combined Entrance Examination (CEE)2025.

Since last year onwards, Diphu Government College, Diphu has been offering academic courses strictly in compliance with NEP 2020 guidelines. Besides the regular courses of study, there is an IGNOU Study Centre and in the Session 2024-25, K.K Handiqui State Open University Study Centre was set up in the college. The new courses will be opened very soon in view of NAAC assessment and NEP institutional development plan.

PROFILE

DIPHU GOVERNMENT COLLEGE

Diphu Government College is NAAC accredited (B++) higher educational institution in Karbi Anglong District of Assam. It was due to the pioneering efforts and visions of Lt. Chatra Sing Teron, Lt. Sai Sai Terang, Lt. Jogendra Nath Goswami, Lt. Dhoniram Rongpi, Lt. Joysing Doloi Terang, Lt. Sar Rongpi and Lt. Padma Kanta Barua, that the college could be formally inaugurated on 23rd June, 1964. The College was a venture Arts College and started initially with only seven students and five teachers. Subsequently the college was incorporated by Government of Assam in the year 1967. A lot of combined efforts were made by the noble founders along with the founding Principal Dr. P.K. Bhuyan and student leaders. Their tireless efforts could convert the college into Diphu Government College. However, Science and Commerce streams were introduced in the year 1979 and 1987 respectively. The College campus is located at latitude 25.84° and longitude 93.42° on a hillock of the district head quarter, Diphu. The college campus is spread into an area of 82 bighas of land. It has 15 Departments, around 5000 Students, one Principal, one Vice Principal (appointed by Karbi Anglong Autonomous Council: KAAC), 87 Teachers, 4 Library staff and 71 Non-teaching staff at present.

The college realizes with Dr. R. Kothari that “in the rapidly changing world of today, one thing is certain- yesterday’s educational system will not meet today’s and even less so, the need of tomorrow.” The college is aware of the need and urgency of equipping the learners with tools required for making them compatible to the context of the ever-changing global scenario. Gradual introduction of Degree programs in Arts, Science and Commerce streams is driving the college closer to the cherished goal of imparting higher education facilities in this District. Considering the parameters of employment opportunity, value addition, skill formation and global relevance, the college has been putting relentless efforts in diversifying its courses of studies/programs. Introduction of various courses and programs in recent years proves the dynamic character of this college.

INFRASTRUCTURE OF DIPHU GOVERNMENT COLLEGE

Main building – The main building of Diphu Government College has an RCC two-storied building housing the administrative offices, all the Arts academic departments and classrooms. There is an extended AT building which is now housing the Department of Geography, NCC office and the Cultural museum (Department of History).

Further, there is a two storied building which is accommodating IGNOU Study Centre and College Guest Rooms on the 1st floor. On the ground floor there is the College Canteen, Post Office (PIN: 782462), DGCSUS (Diphu Government College Students’ Union Society) Office and a Health Centre.

Science block - The science block is build separately with multi-storey provision accommodating the Physics departments in the ground floor and the departments of Botany and Zoology in the first floor to create a functional and conducive environment for education. A separate building in the premise of Science block accommodates the Department of Chemistry.

Commerce block- The Department of Commerce has been shifted to a new two-storied building in the year 2025 which also accommodates the KKHSOU Diphu Government College Study Centre.

Sports- The College has a Play ground, a Basket Ball court, a Gymnasium room and various indoor game facilities providing the necessary infrastructure for promotion of games and sports. The College also encourages the students to participate in various Inter college competitions and Tournaments.

College canteen- The college has a canteen for the students, teachers and employees recreation.

Auditorium and Conference Hall- The college has a spacious Auditorium with light and sound facilities and an air conditioned Conference Hall with roof mounted LCD Projector facilities.

Parks and Gardens - The campus is beautified by a College Garden, a Peace Park, Mini Garden and a Solar Energy Park.

The Diphu Government College has a beautiful Botanical Garden embellished with a variety of flowering, fruit-bearing and medicinal plants looked after by the Department of Environment and Forests, Government of Assam. The garden possesses a large pond containing different types of aquatic flora and fauna. This is used as a place of leisure and amusement for the students too.

A plantation site named as “Peace Park” beside the Canteen and Guest House has a good number of eucalyptus and white sandalwood trees. A beautiful flower garden containing varieties of plants in the front side of the College building is always an attracting sight of the people passing by it. A small sized garden of indigenous fruit-bearing trees established a few years back is also an initiative of the college for future use and conservation where student community was especially engaged educating and encouraging them to do more in their life. Recently a Mini garden was also created in front of the Form Receipt Counter for recreation.

Form Receipt Counter – There is a form receipt counter for the students of both Higher secondary and FYUG where they can receive and submit the examination forms accordingly.

Professors and staff colonies- The College has at present 1 (one) Principal’s Residence, 23 (twenty three) Residence for faculties of the college, 3 (three) Hostel Wardens’ Residence and 6 (six) for Non-teaching staff.

Hostel- The College has 3 (Three) hostels: 2 (two) for girls and 1 (One) for boys viz.; **Rasinja Girls’ Hostel, Serdihun Girls’ Hostel and Waisong Boys’ Hostel.**

Moreover, the college has a Digital Central Library with a stock of over 29680 Books. Journals, Newspapers and Magazines are also available to the College community. The college provides ample opportunities to promote general, transferable skill among the students through co-curricular activities like outreach program organized by NSS wing, NCC, Debating and Extempore Speech Competitions, Wall Magazine, College Magazine, Science Journal, Arts Journal and Commerce Journal, the Annual College Week Festival, Seminars, Literary Competitions etc. A number of forums such as the Arts Society, Science Society, Commerce Society, Sahitya Chora, Planning Forum, Physical Society, Education Forum, History Forum, Political Science Forum, Population Education Club, Career Guidance & Training Cell, etc. are also there. The college has innovative Mentoring system. Individual teachers are mentoring different groups of students to guide them in academic and other information needs.

The college is affiliated to **Assam University (Central University), Silchar.**

The medium of instruction in the college is English.

The college has successfully completed its glorious 50 years since its inception.

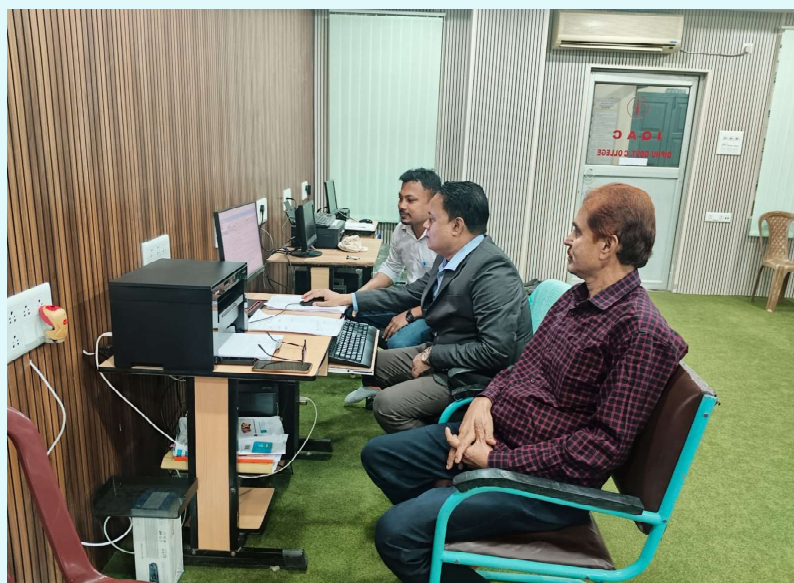

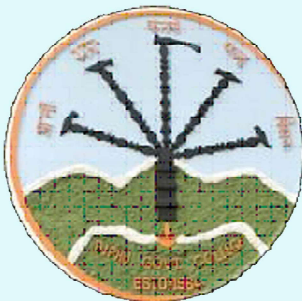

EMBLEM



The emblem of the college is the *Jambili Athon*, which is also the cultural symbol of the Karbis. The *Jambili Athon* is an artifact, made from the wood of the *Bengvoi Tree* (*Holarrhina antidysenterica*). The artifact consists of a main stem and four branches. On the main stem, there is the *Vojaru* (Drongo Bird) and on the side branches are perched different kinds of birds. The *Jambili Athon* is ethnically decorated with beads and *Sobai* (Couries). According to tradition, the *Vojaru* stands for the Karbi King and the other birds symbolize the representatives from traditional territorial divisions of the erstwhile Karbi Kingdom. In short, the *Jambili Athon* reflects the socio-political structure of the Karbis. The hills in the background symbolize the traditional life of the people of Karbi Hills (Anglong). Just below the *Jambili Athon* is a lighted lamp which symbolizes the light of knowledge that dispels darkness and ignorance. The whole symbol is encircled by the motto and name of the college. Below the name of the college is the year of establishment. This emblem was selected for the college since the institution is situated in Karbi Anglong (Karbi Hills); a district carved out for and named after the Karbi Tribe.

Imparting skill development programmes, entrepreneurship and self employability are to be prioritized. COURSE STRUCTURE

A: PROGRAMS OF STUDY:

The college offers the following programs in all the three streams of study, namely, Arts, Science and Commerce.

1. *Higher Secondary Courses (Arts, Science & Commerce)*
2. *Four Years Under Graduate programs in Science, Arts and Commerce streams.*
3. *Self Financing Courses (Six months Certificate Courses for Degree Students)*
 - *Certificate course in Assamese Language.*

B: COURSES AND SUBJECTS:

1. HIGHER SECONDARY COURSES:

There will be 6 compulsory subjects in total for all students. Subjects to be taken in each stream are divided in groups namely A, B & C.

Criteria for adopting subjects:

- **Science stream and Commerce Stream-** English and MIL/Alt. English compulsory, Maximum 4 subjects from Group B, if taken 3 then one subject from Group C to be taken.
- **Arts Stream:** English and MIL/Alt. English compulsory, Maximum 3 subjects from Group B, one subject from Group C is compulsory to opt.
- Class XI- Environmental Education and in Class XII- General Studies as 7th paper

NOTE: All Higher Secondary Students, irrespective of streams, desiring to offer MIL other than Assamese, Bodo and Karbi (like Hindi Bengali, Manipuri, Nepali, Hmar, etc.) may do so, under the guidance of teachers of the respective subjects. At the time of filling up the examination form, he/she must attach a certificate to this effect and pay a non- collegiate fee to be fixed by College.

NEP 2020

The National Education Policy 2020 was approved by the union cabinet of India on 29th July 2020 with a vision of new education system of India. The new education policy replaces the previous national policy on education 1986. The national education policy 2020 proposes various reforms in school education as well as higher education including technical education. Primarily NEP 2020 incorporate a flexible curricular structure. It include integration of stem, multi disciplinary and holistic education, skill development courses, Indian language, culture and art, environment and value based education, multiple entry and exit, community engagement and service, research and internship along with industry-academia linkages etc. The salient features of NEP are as follows: -

- To ensure universal accesses
- To ensure quality early childhood care
- To introduce new curricular
- No hard separation between Arts and Science stream, between curricular and extracurricular activities, between vocational and academic streams.
- To establish national mission on foundational literacy and Numeracy.
- To establish and promote multi lingualism and Indian languages.
- Assessment reforms. In this regard new national assessment center is developed.”PARAKH”(Performance Assessment Review and Analysis of knowledge for holistic development.)
- Equitable and inclusive Education. Special emphases given in socially and economically disadvantaged groups (SEDGs)
- A separate Gender inclusive on fund and special education zones for disadvantaged regions and groups.
- Robust and transparent processes for recruitment of teachers and merit based performance.
- Exposure of vocational education.
- Holistic and multidisciplinary education with multiple entry/exit system, options.
- Common entrance exam for admission to HEIs.
- Setting up of multidisciplinary education and Research universities.
- Setting up of National Research Foundation (NRF).
- Single overarching umbrella body for promotion of higher education excluding medical and legal education.

- Professional education will be an integral part of the higher education system.
- To achieve 100% youth and adult education.

FOUR-YEAR UG PROGRAM (FYUGP)

Primary Guidelines for implementation of NEP 2020 for UG Courses of colleges affiliated to Assam University, Silchar.

In order to implement NEP 2020 from the session 2023-24 for UG courses in affiliated colleges following primary guidelines will be followed:

1. UG curriculum for colleges affiliated to Assam University shall be a four-year UG programme (FYUG) as per curriculum structure provided in Annexure-I. Option for lateral exit shall be free from additional 04 credit earnings. In lieu of Project/ Dissertation in VIII Semester, students shall have option to take three additional courses as Discipline Specific Courses which will be equal to 12 credits in total. However, students opting for project/dissertation will be given Honours with Research degree and students opting for additional three Discipline Specific courses in lieu of Project/ Dissertation will be given Honours degree. It is decided that in their respective prospectus each college should categorically mention this. It is also resolved that all those three papers (DSC-452, 453 and 454) should be of level 500.
2. Offering Four Year Under Graduate (FYUG) programme is mandatory for all affiliated colleges. However, the colleges/ Departments shall have liberty if Honours with research be offered or not depending upon their infrastructural limitation. If Honours with Research is not offered in a particular college, respective prospectus should clearly mention this to avoid confusion amongst students.
3. Interdisciplinary courses shall have 04 baskets viz; Natural Sciences (NS), Social Sciences (SS), Humanities (HN) and Commerce & Management (CM). Students may opt for any one from those 04 baskets in each of I, II and III semesters. Bunching of subjects in each basket shall be as per Annexure-II.
4. From Discipline Specific Minor students shall take two subjects related to his/her Discipline. Each such subject should of 50% of total credit allotted to this course. Viz; for Three Year UG programme each Discipline Specific Minor shall be of 13 credits and for Four Year UG programme each Discipline Specific Minor shall be of 17 credits. Assam University shall notify cluster of subjects from which Discipline Specific Minor (DSM) can be chosen. To be more precise it is decided that DSM-101(3), DSM -201(4), DSM -251(3), and DSM-301(3) = 13 credits should be the first minor subjects in case of Three Year UG Programme (TYUG) and DSM-151(3), DSM -252(3), DSM-302(3) and DSM- 351(4) =13 should be second minor subject. For FYUG Programme DSM- 401(4) should be first minor subject and DSM- 451(4) should be second minor subject.
5. Students securing highest CGPA (above 6.5) and with no back paper shall be allowed to change his/ her core course once only, after completion of second semester. However, if candidate desires to make one of his/her minors to core them automatic change in the minor should be done as same subject cannot be opted as both core and minor. Also change of core may be allowed only within allied subjects.
6. 7.5 CGPA should be obtained by a student up to 3rd year for opting Honours with Research Degree in 4th year. However, for only Honours degree there shall not be any CGPA restriction. But students with arrear paper shall not be allowed to move to 4th year in any case.

7. Evaluation of 3 and 4 credit courses shall be out of 100 marks and that for 2 credit courses shall not be out of 50 marks.
8. IDC courses opted shall remain same for all three semesters. Semester wise change of IDC is not allowed.
9. For AEC courses, there shall not be any internal exam. Total marks for AEC examination shall be 50 with two hours examination duration.
10. SEC shall have to be opted from either DSC or DSM. Evaluation method for SEC for Science stream shall be 50 (End Semester Theory) + 30 (End sem Practical/Project/Field work) +20 (internal test of which 14 for test and 6 for attendance). The same for Arts and Commerce shall be 50 (End Semester Theory) +20 (End semester Practical/Project/Field work) + 30 (internal test of which 20 for test and 10 for attendance).
11. For EVS (VAC-151) evaluation method shall be 70 (End semester Exam) +30 Internal/Assignment. Marks for Internal test shall again be divided to 20 for written test and 10 for attendance.
12. Evaluation method for VAC-101 (with practical) shall be same as that of SEC (with Practical) and that of VAC-101 (without practical) shall be same as VAC-151.
13. EVS in VAC-151 should be of 100 level and EVS included in Natural Science Basket as IDC should be of 200 level.
14. Publication / Presentation of papers out of Research Project / Dissertation carried out in VIII semester is not mandatory. However, the project shall have to be presented before Departmental Research Committee and in presence of an external examiner during end Semester examination. Total marks for the project shall be 300 of which 90 shall be internal and 210 is for end semester examination. Out of 90 marks as internal, in case of Dissertation/Project, there shall be three progress reviews and each review shall be of 30 marks. Marks obtained by a student in each of the review shall be notified immediately. Review of progress shall be done by concerned supervisor in presence of Departmental Research Committee.
15. For all other courses evaluation method shall be of 70 marks (for end semester Examination) and 30 marks (for Internal Examination). Marks for Internal test shall again be divided to 20 for written test and 10 for attendance.
16. Natural Science in IDC, shall not have any practical component.
17. For subjects with practical's DSC-152, DSC-253, DSC-303, DSC-354 and DSC-404 shall be practical with 100 marks. Practical examination shall be held in presence of External Examiner.
18. For subjects with practical DSM-251 shall be practical for first minor and DSM-351 shall be practical for second minor. Marks for practical examination shall be 100 each and examination shall be held in presence of External Examiner.
19. For VAC 151 (EVS), shall not have any practical component.
20. For opting DSC and DSM combination, clustering of subjects shall be as per ANNEXURE-III. DSC from one cluster and DSM from other cluster is not allowed. DSC, DSM and IDC cannot be the same subject.
21. All DSM courses shall be stand alone and student can select first minor subject and second minor subject according to their choice keeping total requirement of 17 credits for each minor but they cannot change the code of minor papers. Viz; one student of Physics (Core) may have Chemistry as first minor in DSM 101 and Mathematics as second minor in DSM 151. But the other student of

Physics (Core) may have Mathematics as first minor in DSM-101 and Chemistry as second minor in DSM 151.

22. For Research with Honours students, DSC-451 paper shall be research methodology and content of this course shall be same across the subjects and across the disciplines. However, for other students, DSC 451 will be a usual 500 level paper.
23. **Any student interested to opt for Honours with Research should have 7.5 CGPA up to third year without any arrear.**
24. In lieu of MIL, Alternative English may be opted by a student.

LECTURE PERIODS / CLASSES:

There shall be a minimum of 50 lecture Periods/ Classes for theory papers in pass Course and 60 Lecture Periods/ classes in Honours Course. Minimum of 20-30 hours shall be for each.

TENTATIVE SCHEDULE OF CLASSES:**

- (i) Odd semester classes from 1st August
- (ii) Even Semester classes from 1st January.

Classes shall be continued till 15 days before commencement of the examinations.

CLASS ATTENDANCE:

Class Attendance shall be calculated on the basis of actual number of classes held during each semester in each course/ paper. Number of decimal be rounded off to next higher number (e.g., 74.01% be rounded off to 75%). Marks once submitted by the concerned department, the marks under CCA shall be the final and binding to all concerned.

A student with less than 75% of attendance on average of all the papers (excluding “Additional GE Course, if any) of the concerned semester shall NOT be allowed to appear in that End Semester Examination (ESE) but will be allowed to get admission in the immediate next higher semester. However, such a student may appear in the subsequent similar ESE (odd/even) in all the papers and, marks to be awarded under CCA for each paper shall be the marks previously secured by the student in the concerned paper.

Note: Marks under CCA shall be carried forward as per above rule only if the student secure Pass marks in the Unit Test/s else he/she shall have to appear in Unit Test/s in the concerned paper along with the regular students in the concerned semester.

SECTION: II

ADMISSION PROCEDURE

Who can apply?

Candidates who have passed HSSLC or equivalent Examination from recognized Board/University in the last **two years** are eligible to apply. Preference will be given to the candidates of Assam State. However, wards of Businessmen and employees serving in Assam will be considered as the candidates of the State provided they produce the necessary documents.

How to apply?

- (i) For admission in Higher Secondary 1st Year eligible candidates may apply through www.darpan.ahseconline.in or www.ahsec.assam.gov.in
- (ii) For admission in FYUG eligible candidates may apply online through the following link: <https://assamadmission.samarth.ac.in> which is also available in our college website: <https://diphugovernmentcollege.com>

Selection Criteria:

1. Admission to all courses of study is made strictly on the basis of merit, i.e., the percentage of marks obtained in the last qualifying examination and valid CUET-UG Score.
2. Reservation of seats will be as per following norms:
 - a) There is a provision for reservation of seats, as per Govt. of Assam rules [OBC/MOBC: 15%, SC: 7%, ST (P): 10% & ST (H): 5%]. For SC, ST (P), ST (H), OBC/MOBC candidates belonging to the state of Assam, caste certificate issued by the competent authority under Govt. of Assam only shall be valid. However, after filling up the reserved seats, if any of the seats found lying vacant, it will be filled up by ST (H) candidates.
 - b) 3% seats are reserved for Differently Abled Candidates.
 - c) 5 seats are reserved for the candidates from other Boards/States (Science: 01, Arts: 03 & Commerce: 01).
 - d) A very limited number of seats are reserved for candidates having proven outstanding performance in co-curricular activities like sports, cultural and literary activities and depending on availability.
 - e) There is also reservation of seats for the children of college employees. However, all selections under reserved quota will be based on merit basis.
 - f) *Any other quota introduced by the government during the course of admission or before completion of admission will be duly acknowledge and complied.*
 - g) In all cases, the decision of the Admission Committee will be final and binding through the head of the institution. Due and necessary care will be paid in this regard.
3. Those candidates who passed the last qualifying exam from the Board/Council outside of Assam state but whose parents are permanent resident of Assam or working in Assam or doing business in Assam, are to provide PRC of Assam or other valid documents justifying their PRC.
4. The candidates seeking admission to FYUG First semester must pass the last qualifying Exam not before 2023. The candidates, who passed the last qualifying Exam in 2023 and 2024 and applying for admission, must produce **GAP CERTIFICATE in ORIGINAL** along with the application form.

The competent authority from whom GAP CERTIFICATE should be obtained is as follows:

- a) Medical officers not below the rank of Medical Superintendent with his/her contact number certifying the duration of treatment of the disease/malady.
- b) The Head Master/Principal where the candidates studied last, certifying that the candidate is well known to him/her along with the contact number.
- c) The Block Development officer certifying that the candidate is well known to him/ her along with the contact number.
- d) Any candidate working for short-term course must be certified by the institutional regional head of the course/ organisation.

5. Passing from repugnant institution/Board will not be entertained.

6. The candidates passed under *COMPARTMENTAL* will *NOT BE ENTITLED* for admission.

E: Post Admission Duties:

1. Admitted Students may apply for change of subject(s) in Class XII to the institution alongwith Marks-sheet of Class XI Annual examination and reason for the change of subject.
2. Change of Stream from Arts and Commerce to Science will not be allowed.
3. Admitted Students of FYUG seeking subject change will have to apply to the Principal, DGC within 30 days of admission. Such applications must be approved by the competent authority. As AU rules, no such application will be entertained after 30 days from the date of admission.
4. Registration Form after being duly filled up by the candidates must be submitted to the Office of the Principal, DGC on dates notified later on.
5. Ignorance of any rules will not be entertained as a plea for violation of any rules.
6. The Prospectus shall not be treated as document. The rules, clauses, policies indicated in the Prospectus are only for general information and may be modified /changed from time to time by the appropriate authority.

SECTION: III

STUDENT SUPPORT FACILITIES

A: HOSTEL ACCOMMODATION:

The college has two Girls' Hostels and one Boys' Hostel with the capacity of 70 (seventy) seats in each Hostel. Candidates may apply for the Hostel seats in prescribed Admission Form available at the Office of the Principal, DGC. However, admission to a course of study in the college does not bestow any guarantee or right for Hostel accommodation. Each Hostel is provided with a common mess, for which the boarders are required to pay a certain mess fee as fixed by a committee under the supervision of the Hostel Superintendent.

B: IDENTITY CARD:

At the time of admission, each and every student shall be provided with an Identity Card, and he/she shall carry it at the time of attending the classes. An Identity Card is valid for one academic session. On expiry of the Identity Card, it has to be surrendered for renewal. Loss of Identity Card should be reported to the Police immediately. A duplicate Identity Card shall be issued to the student on receipt of the Police Report and on payment of Rs. 100/- (One hundred) only.

C: LIBRARY:

Central Library, DGC was started with the establishment of the college, as an information centre for meeting the information requirements of the academic community of the college. The main functions of the library include collection and development of knowledge resources, retrieval and dissemination of information to the end users including the academic community.

The Central Library of the College is upgraded to Digital Central Library in 2015.

Moreover, the college has a Central Library with a stock of over 51,000 Books. Journals, Newspapers and Magazines are also available to the College community.

A student can borrow books from the library for a period of 15 days from the date of issue. A fine of Re.1/- per day will be imposed if a book is not returned within 15 days. Library Card(s) is/ are issued to students and they can borrow books against the card.

- 1. Higher Secondary Students: One card each and two books against it.**
- 2. FYUG (Pass) students: One Card each and four books against it.**

Reading Hours: 11.00 AM to 3.00 PM

Library visitors are to sign a Library Register at the Library entrance.

LIBRARY SERVICES:

1. Wi-fi internet connection.
2. Document search through OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogue).
3. User can issue/ return documents (books) through self service process.
4. Central Library and Information Services organises Book Exhibition every year.
5. Display of News Papers clippings and career/employment information on display board for the readers.
6. Users Suggestions are received through a Suggestion Box and the concerned authority respond them timely.
7. Conducting user survey periodically “Annual Best User Award” for students has been instituted to motivate the user to the library.

D: SCHOLARSHIP :

Various Scholarships are available as per Govt. rules. Scholarship money is directly credited to the students' respective bank accounts.

E: STUDENTS AID FUND:

The college has a “Students' Aid Fund”. Deserving and meritorious students coming from economically weaker sections of the society are given financial aid out of this fund, provided they do not avail any other kind of scholarship.

F: STUDENTS' TRAVEL CONCESSION:

Students are entitled to Travel Concession by Rail on their way home from the institution and during vacation only.

G: CAREER AND PLACEMENT CELL:

SECTION: IV

INTERNAL EXAMINATION AND PROMOTION RULES

A: EXAMINATION RULES:

i) College Examinations

- a) All students must appear in Unit/Terminal/Selection Test Examinations conducted by the college. No student shall be allowed to fill up the final examination form without passing in test examinations. In case of illness, sick bed will be provided.
- b) The following examinations will be conducted by the College during an academic year:

Class	Examination
(i) HS 1 st Year	Unit test, Half yearly and Annual Exam
(ii) HS 2 nd Year	Unit test, Half yearly, Revisionary test and Annual Exam
(iii) FYUG semester Classes	Two unit Tests in each semester and End semester exam (ESE)

- c) The suitability of the students to appear at the final examination with subject (s) having practical will be decided on the basis of their regularity and performance in the laboratory work. Those found below standard will not be allowed to appear at the final examination.
- d) For all the College examinations, pass marks as laid down by ASSEB, DIV. II /Assam University will be taken as standard for selection test. Relaxations, if any, will be decided by the ***“Committee for finalization of results of selection test examination.”***
- e) Absence from the selection test examination shall mean detention but under special circumstances may be considered on the merit of the periodical examination. No such consideration will be made in case of students attending below 75% classes in respect of both Higher Secondary and Four Year Under Graduate Programme students. **Students declared as discollegiate are debarred from appearing in the test examination.**
- f) Result of defaulters on account of College, Hostel, NCC, Sports, Student’s Union, Library matters will be kept withheld.
- g) Re-admission of unsuccessful students will be governed by “College Admission Rules”.
- h) Expulsion from any examination will lead to the expulsion from the College.

ii) Promotion Rules for HS First Year:

- a) The promotion Examination for HS First Year will be conducted by the college as per instruction prescribed by Assam State School education Board (ASSEB), DIV-II, Bamunimaidam: Guwahati-
- b) The Promotion Examination will be held both in Theory & Practical as per mark pattern prescribed by Assam State School education Board (ASSEB), DIV-II, Bamunimaidam: Guwahati-21
- c) In Class XI Annual Examination, a candidate has to pass in both the MCQ type part and descriptive type part of the subject separately with 33% of marks separately.
- d) The promotion to HS Second Year will be given on the basis of Grade A, B, C, or D which will be as follows:
 - e) Grade A: Duly Pass & total mark scored 300 or more.
 - f) Grade B: Duly Pass & total mark scored 250 or more but less than 300
 - g) Grade C: Duly pass & total mark scored 150 or more but less than 250
 - h) Grade D: Promoted under consideration.
 - i) No promotion will be considered under MEDICAL GROUNDS.
 - j) Student must appear the exam in all CORE and ELECTIVE SUBJECTS and must score minimum qualifying marks for promotion.

NOTE:

1. “Failed students” may get re-admitted into the same class as “casual students” subject to availability of seats. However, they cease to be bonafide students of the college.
2. H.S. students must complete his/her courses within 5(five) years from the date of registration.
3. FYUG students must complete his/her courses within 7 years as per guidelines of the University.

SECTION: V

HEALTHY PRACTICES

The College has devised the following healthy practices to reflect its mission, philosophy and vision.

1. Hygiene:

A neat and clean environment leaves a strong positive bearing in the minds of the stakeholders' viz. the students, teachers and other members of an educational Institution. It is the duty of every student to keep the college campus beautiful and attractive.

2. Academic:

There should be calm, cool and congenial environment in an institution of higher education for academic pursuit. Diphu Government College is to play the lead role in this hill district. It must shoulder the responsibility of providing academic leadership to the academic fraternity. Towards this end, the college authority organizes district level workshops/Seminars, wherein the members of social organizations, journalists, teachers, lawyers, students and youth organizations, leading citizens, guardians, administrators, educationists and the like, participate, deliberate, give suggestions and adopt follow-up actions based on consensus for the conducive academic environment in the district.

3. Career Guidance:

The college is offering career and academic counselling facilities to the students. The Career Guidance Cell has a good collection of books and brochures on career options. The Cell organizes counselling sessions not only in the college but also outside the college. The Faculty of the Career Guidance Cell is also invited by various organizations to act as Resource Persons in the career counselling sessions. The Cell conducts coaching programmes at the college for Engineering and Medical Entrance Tests for the benefit of students.

4. Departmental Academic Register- Every departments maintain the departmental academic register and keeps the updated syllabus completion of the department.

5. Academic Monitoring Committee- The Academic Monitoring Committee is responsible for plaining and monitoring of overall academic operation, activities, procedures etc.

6. Departmental academic in-charge:

Each department appoint a departmental academic in-charge to look after the academic progress of the department.

7. Publication:

The college has two ongoing publications:

1. News Letter
2. Sowarani/Memoir : It is a publication dedicated to the retired employees of the College.

8. Teacher Guide Program:

About 90% of the students enrolled in Diphu Govt. College come from rural areas. Many of them are first generation college goers. Most of their parents are illiterate and ignorant about the need demands of formal higher education system. Many of the students, it is observed, tend to neglect or become oblivious of their primary duty of STUDYING after being acclimatized in the college campus. It has been noticed on many occasions that many of the students commit grave mistakes with respect to their Academic, Examination, Office and University related works due to lack of proper guidance and timely warning from teachers, guardians,

etc. The students fail to optimise and get the benefit of the available learning resources on account of ignorance. As such a TEACHER-GUIDE PROGRAMME has been conceptualised and subsequently instituted from the academic session 2005-06 in order to legitimise the teacher-student interface so that the student community is benefited of effective guidance, advice etc from the teachers.

Under the TEACHER-GUIDE PROGRAMME, a teacher (excluding the contractual teachers) would guide a group of students of about 30 to 40. Other things remaining the same (such as workable size of the group), effort has been made to constitute groups belonging to the same stream. The guiding activities will be confined within the objectives and areas mentioned as follows: class attendance monitoring, guiding co-curricular activities, career guidance and counselling, library use guidance, examination related guidance, college related information, and any other viewed necessary to better college academic performance. The success of the TEACHER-GUIDE PROGRAMME will depend mostly on student's perception and initiative.

9. Outreach Programme:

The college authority always encourages outreach Programme such as Community Service, Poor Students Aid, Medical Camp, National Integration Camp, Literacy Drive, Blood Donation, Water Quality Improvement, Plantation Drive, Anti- Cruelty to Animal, Environment Awareness, AIDS Control & Anti-drug, Students Exchange Program, Science Exhibition, and the like.

10. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC):

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of Diphu Government College was established in the year 2005 as per NAAC guidelines. The function of IQAC, as its name indicates, is to monitor the activities of the various units of the college and coordinate among them as well as to make necessary suggestions for further academic development of the college. The cell is also responsible for making the necessary liaison between the institution & U.G.C.

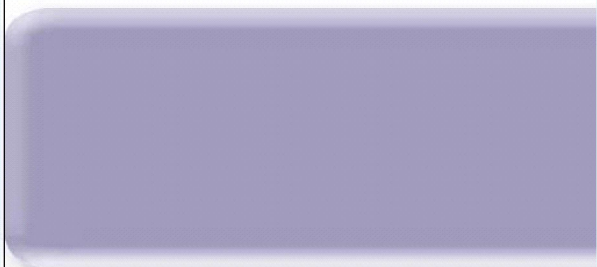
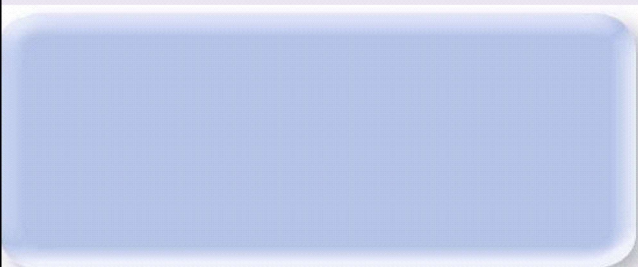

16. Discipline:

1. Students admitted to the college must abide by the rules and regulation as prescribed by the college authority. Violation of rules, unsatisfactory progress, irregular attendance, irregular payment of college and hostel fees, disrespect to teachers and office staff in any form, adoption of unfair means during examination, causing damage to the Government property etc. are some of the offences which may invite disciplinary actions like imposition of fine, terminal of scholarship, non-awards of college diploma/degree, forced transfer and even expulsion from the college and hostels.
2. ***All forms of Ragging in the college campus are strictly prohibited. Strong disciplinary action will be initiated if anyone is found to be involved directly or indirectly in Ragging.***
3. Societies and Associations formed by the students of the college shall be subject to such rules and regulations as the college administration may prescribe from time to time. Only such Societies and Associations which are recognized by the Principal shall enjoy the facilities of the college premises.
4. Any notice to be pasted or circulated by the students in and around the college and hostel premises shall require prior approval of the Principal.
5. All powers of maintaining discipline in the college are vested with the Principal and his decision shall be final in all such matters.
6. Students will have to switch off cell phone inside the class room and in the corridors of the college building. Students are directed to use their cell phone only in the safe zone i.e. College Canteen and Common Room.
7. All the students are to come to the College decently dressed. For this purpose, Students' uniform has been introduced as specified below from the academic session 2016-17.
8. Attendance of students in lectures/Laboratory works, Tutorial classes and appearance in the Terminal/ Test Examinations are compulsory. Only those students attending individual classes up to 75% or above are allowed to appear the AHSEC/Assam University examinations. For irregular students, specific University or Council's regulations shall be applied.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR THE STUDENTS : A student enrolled in an educational establishment serves as the fundamental basis of an institution. They represent the forthcoming members of society upon whom the progress and advancement of a country depend. It is imperative that they conform to the standards established by the college. Students must abide by the rules and regulations prescribed by the institution. Students are required to adhere to the prescribed uniform as instructed by the college administration. Additionally, students are expected to have their identification cards with them at all times when on campus. Students must consistently attend all classes and achieve the needed credit in each course. Students are encouraged to make efficient use of their spare time on campus by participating in creative activities, utilizing the college library, and so forth. It is imperative for students to participate on educative-recreational activities such as excursions, field trips, and educational tours. They should abide by all the laws and regulations while participating in excursions, field work, and educational tours. Students should familiarize themselves with the academic calendar as stipulated by the college. Students are expected to routinely monitor the notice boards and the college website for pertinent notifications, announcements, and other relevant information. Students are expected to uphold a standard of quietness and orderliness when on the college premises. Spitting, littering, and loitering are explicitly forbidden and will result in strict disciplinary measures. Students are expected to use cell phones in a judicious manner without causing disturbance to others and destruction of the teaching-

learning process. Students are advised against engaging in any form of misconduct during examinations. Engaging in academic dishonesty, such as cheating and other forms of malpractice during exams, will result in disciplinary measures. Engaging in ragging and activities that are anti-institutional, anti-national, anti-social, or involve in immoral or political expressions is strictly forbidden and subject to punishment. Organizing any event within the campus necessitates obtaining permission from the college authority. Students are not allowed to distribute any objectionable news or materials that could harm the reputation or interests of the college. Damage to any college property or items will be regarded as a severe transgression. Engaging in vigilantism rather than according to the prescribed procedural stages and measures about any occurrence will be viewed as a grave offense. Students should familiarize themselves with the grievance redressal cell and Internal Complaints Committee. It is imperative for students to demonstrate reverence towards the national flag and the national song. They are encouraged to engage in the observance of important occasions held on the college grounds, such as Republic Day, Independence Day, and College Foundation Day. It is anticipated that each student will uphold overall cleanliness standards in the classrooms, laboratories, and on the college premises. Utilization of a dustbin is vital. Consumption of paan, gutka, tobacco products, smoking, and intoxicating substances are absolutely forbidden on the college grounds. Students are required to maintain exemplary behavior. Should a student engage in any form of indiscipline, the college authorities and the disciplinary committee have the jurisdiction to implement disciplinary measures, which may include suspension or expulsion from the institution.

CODE OF CONDUCT FOR THE BOARDERS: It is the responsibility of the boarders to adhere to the regulations established by the warden of the hostel concerning meal schedules, study hours, roll call timing, and other related matters. During study hours, no boarder is permitted to leave the hostel premises without authorization from the warden. Boarders are required to seek approval from the warden for any leave requests. It is mandatory for boarders to settle all outstanding payments and obtain written consent from the warden before leaving the hostel premises. Any complaint or allegation made by a boarder against another boarder, the mess manager/in-charge, the cook, or the kitchen/dining hall assistant/helper must be reported to the warden. The warden has the authority to expel or have a boarder evicted from the hostel in the event of any significant transgression committed by the boarder. Being expelled from the hostel results in automatic expulsion from the college. No boarder is allowed to leave the hostel after sunset without the warden's consent. Application for leave of absence of boarders will not be granted or considered without written agreement of the local guardian of the boarder concerned. Prior to joining, leaving, or exiting the hostel, all boarders must obtain authorization from the warden. All boarders must maintain cleanliness and tidiness in their rooms. Boarders must obtain permission from the warden before using items such as radios, heaters, and electric irons. The under mentioned acts of boarders shall be deemed as serious offences – i) Unauthorized overnight absence from the hostel without the warden's approval. ii) Hosting or accommodating any visitor at the hostel without the authorization of the warden. iii) Disrupting or annoying fellow boarders by any misbehavior. iv) Engaging in immoral and unethical behaviors. v) Persistent lack of discipline or habitual violation of regulations. vi) Inappropriate and disrespectful conduct towards the warden, or members of the hostel managing committee. vii) Vandalism of hostel property or objects. viii) Engaging in actions that disrupt social order, injury to any individual, or incite social unrest, such as inciting community conflict, using inflammatory language, or making disruptive comments. ix) Acts of aggression, bullying, or using inappropriate language towards fellow boarders, kitchen staff, dining hall assistants, or helpers. x) Vigilantism instead of adhering to procedural steps and measures related to any incident. xi) If a boarder is found to have misappropriated mess related fund, the warden will take action, and the person concerned could be expelled from the hostel.

17. Anti-ragging measures:

As per the order of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India and recommendations of RK Raghavan Committee, the following measures have been followed to deal with the menace of ragging in the college.

Introduction:

Now a days, Ragging means *“Display of noisy, disorderly conduct, teasing, excitement by rough or rude treatment or handling, indulging in rowdy, undisciplined activities which cause or likely to cause annoyance, undue hardship, physical or psychological harm or raise apprehension or fear in a fresher, or asking the students to do any act or perform some which such a student will not do in the ordinary course and which cause him/her or embarrassment or danger to his/her life”*

This institution considers ragging in any form a cognizable offence and really means business and will not hesitate to take stern action against the offenders.

A Vigilance & Disciplinary Committee, DGC consisting of senior faculty members, some hostel authorities like wardens and a few responsible senior students has been constituted to have an in-built mechanism for checking the incidence of ragging. The committee will monitor the events involving ragging, enquire into them, make recommendation and spell out the punishments in this regard to the authorities of the institution.

Anti-ragging Squad, DGC which was working under DGCSUS previously has been rejuvenated with the inclusion of more individuals like senior teachers, members of DGCSUS, teacher i/c NCC and rank holder cadets which will make sudden raids on vulnerable spots.

The institution guarantees care and safety to the Freshers. The freshers' are not to fear any atrocities from the so-called 'seniors'.

Fresher should report incidents of ragging as immediately as possible. Those, who do not do so, even when being witnesses or victims will be punished.

Punishments:

The following could be the possible punishments for those who are found guilty of participation in or abetment of ragging. The quantum of punishment shall, naturally, depend upon the nature and gravity of the offence as established by the Disciplinary Committee or the Court of Law.

1. Cancellation of Admission.
2. Suspension from attending classes.
3. Withholding/withdrawing scholarship and other benefits.
4. Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other evaluation process.
5. Withholding of results.
6. Debarring from representing the institution in any national or international events.
7. Suspension/ expulsion from the hostel.
8. Rustication from the institution which may extend from 1 to 2 years.
9. Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution.
10. Fine up to Rs. 25,000/-
11. Rigorous imprisonment up to three years.

While the first 10 types of punishment can be awarded by the appropriate authority of the institution itself, the last punishment can be awarded only by a court of law.

18. Co-curricular activities:

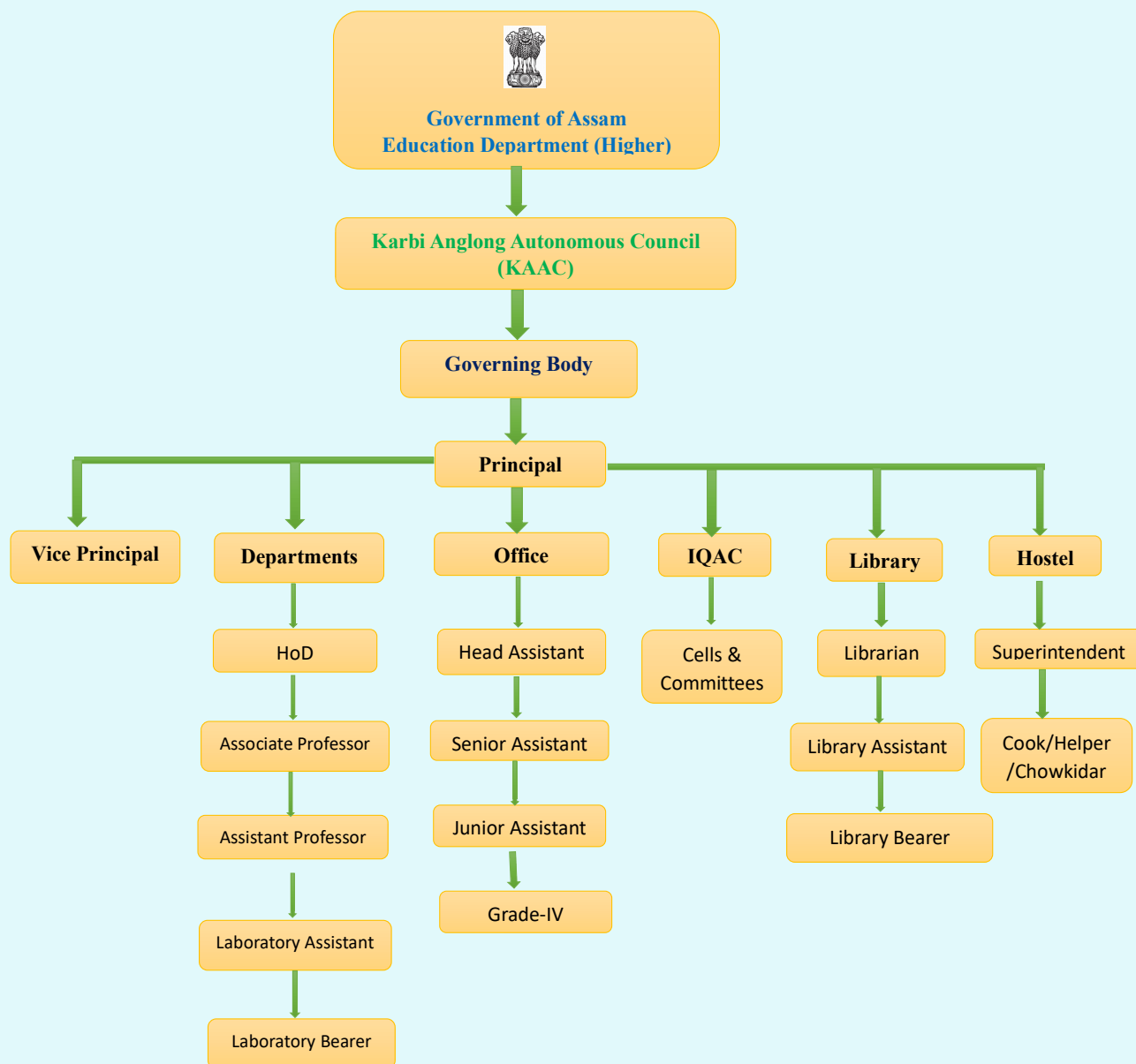

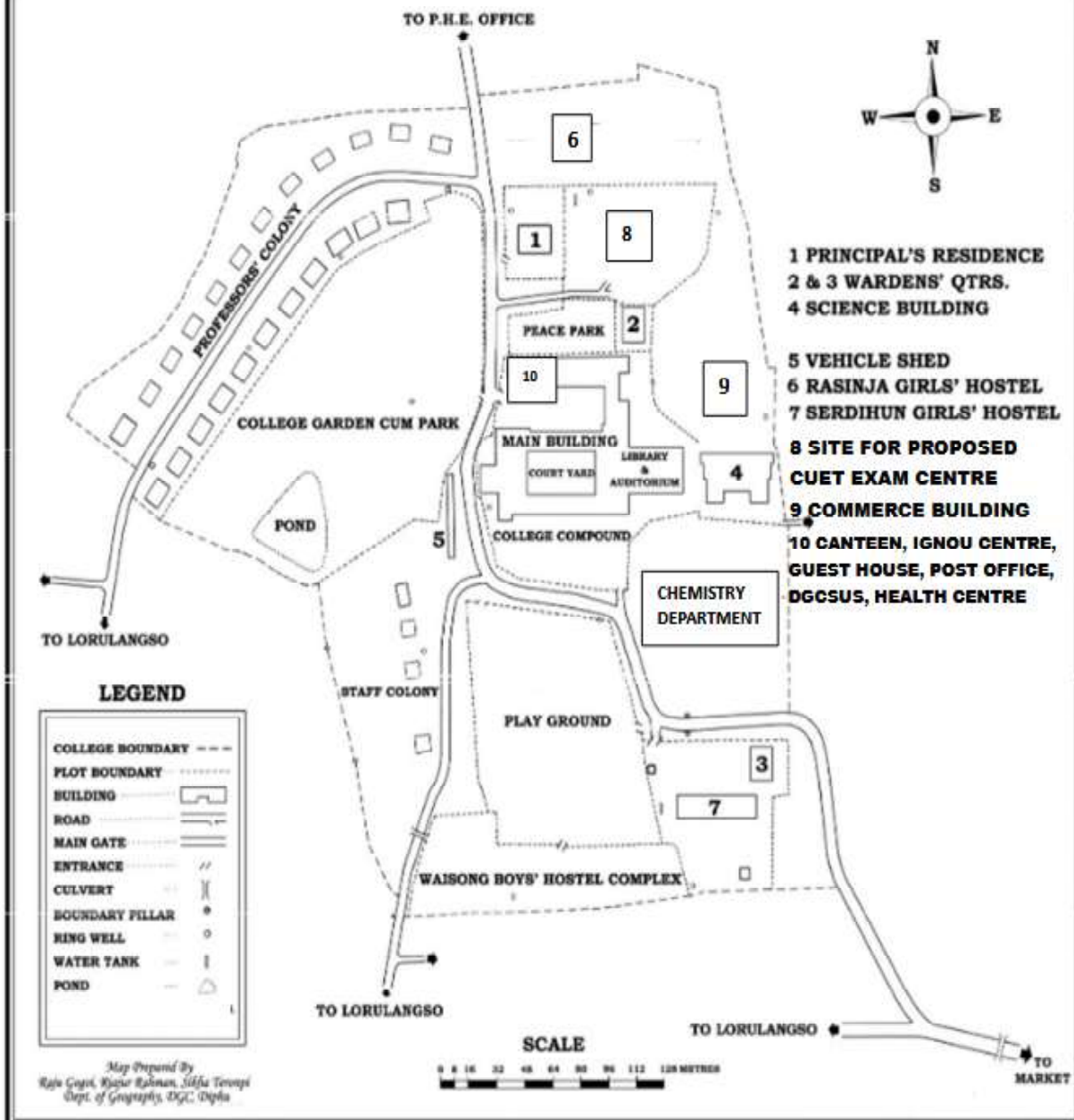

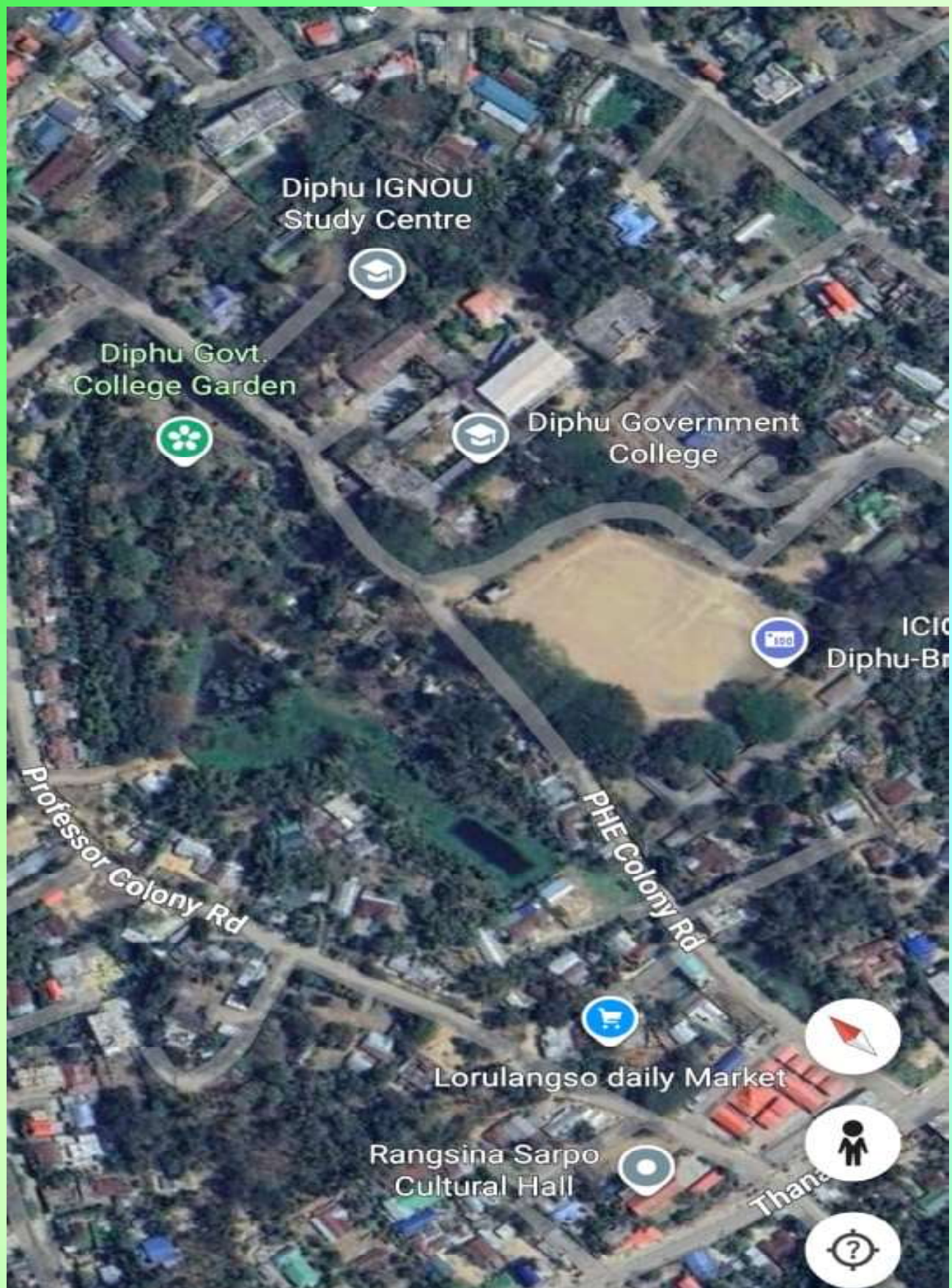
